When you decided to put together a band, how did recording, merchandising, production, distribution and getting signed fit into things?

Being in Born Without Bones as a member instead of a solo moniker has made everything a bit more complicated but also much more satisfying. Now when we're asked to do anything I have to ask three other guys if they can do it too. When the band was a solo project I was recording music by layering my ideas on top of my ideas. It felt pretty one dimensional. I think our music is a lot more interesting now that I'm working with three other creative minds. It's cool that we can get in arguments about certain parts of The first tour I did with other bands was with Handguns. I Call Fives and songs because we all care about how the songs come out. We can also do a The Tired And True. That was truly an amazing experience. I saw a lot of lot more because the business aspect of being in a band doesn't just fall on states for the first time on that tour. I Call Fives get a lot of flack for some one person. Right now we're working on printing and distributing our reason but I really think they're sweet people. They were the first band to music by ourselves. The band can self sustain much better now that more make me feel good about being on the road and playing shows. people are involved.
